Context of project	The heavy torrential rains which occurred during the months of March and April 2020 in DRC in general and in the province of Tanganyika / Kalemie in particular, were roots of the very considerable floods which caused catastrophic consequences for the population with huge material damage, leaving therefore other households without shelter, fields or means of subsistence with a permanent risk of resurgence of Cholera in the most affected areas. Moreover, this situation, as negative as it was already, has further strengthened in a certain way this psychosis created by the appearance of the COVID-19 pandemic around mid-March in the Democratic Republic of Congo by making the affected areas quite vulnerable while accentuating the risk of spreading this disease.

Therefore, given that the majority of the population of Kalemie territory obtains water from Lake Tanganyika and Lukuga River, it has been noted that these last ones would be highly exposed to water-borne diseases due to overflowing water and lack of installation of chlorination sites. In addition, the territory of Kalemie being surrounded by provinces affected by the COVID-19 pandemic in DRC including South Kivu and Haut-Katanga and also bordering countries affected by the pandemic including Tanzania, the territory of Kalemie in particular and the province of Tanganyika in general is in a position of high risk of contamination and spread of this disease at the base of a global health crisis.

It is in this context that the Salvation Army of Tanganyika with the funding from the International Salvation Army (International Emergency Services) has:

• Supported Kalemie and Nyemba health zones by installing twenty (20) chlorination sites and ten (10) by health zone.

This as part of the implementation of the project **«Prevention** against Covid-19 and Cholera in the flood affected in Kalemie»

Projet Objectives

Main objective

• Preventing and Fighting Cholera and the Covid-19 Pandemic.

Specific objectives

- Sensitize the population on the project, the adoption of good hygiene and hand washing practices as well as the observation of barrier measures during this period;
- Make hand washing kits available in the targeted places and support beneficiaries in their management and use;
- Strengthen the activities of the PCI subcommittee.

Axecuted Activities Targeting of sites



- **1) Cholera**: A meeting was organized between the Salvation Army and the health zones (MCZs and EHA supervisors), after this meeting, the Salvation Army presented the project and highlighted all the shaded areas. And afterwards, the health zones presented a list of 20 priority and strategic sites, to be supported according to the capacity of the response and on the basis of this list; a field mission with WASH supervisors was organized for the mapping of the intervention.
- Kalemie and Nyemba health zone: Lukuga, lake, Jumbo, Kaseke bridge, Kaseke market, Conader, Kalumbi 2, Baguette, RVA and Charly sites, the site of Abattoir 2, Abattoir 1, Pont Lukuga (bridge Lukuga), Umoja 1, Nzambe



Malamu, Ciel du Lac, Agape, Monusco, Kichanga 3 and Kichanga 4 sites.

Delivery of kits

2) *Cholera*: On 29th May, 2020, a meeting was held in one of the halls of General Reference Hospital in Kalemie between the Salvation Army, the WASH supervisors of the health zones and the Chlorinators, the objective of which was to give the briefing to Chlorinators on the project, on the project expectations, on the equipment management, on the compliance with hygienic standards, on the use of chlorine, reporting, raising awareness among beneficiaries on the importance of using drinking water, awareness of Covid-19, allocation of chlorinators in the sites, the signing of the agreement etc.

A morning deployment mission of kits in the sites was organized between the WASH Supervisors and the Salvation Army in order to deliver the kits per site and make them operational. Minutes were duly drawn up.

Covid-19:

Under the coordination of PCI (Infection Prevention and Control) which is the body responsible for coordinating actions against epidemics in the province, a mission was carried out between the Salvation Army and WASH supervisors in two health zones whose main objective was to prospect the targeted places, establish a list of urgent needs and set up site mapping to facilitate the transportation of equipment planned in the project. After this visit, 30 places were targeted by the heads of the health zones, namely:

• Kalemie and Nyemba Heath zone:

The health centers and states services assisted in terms of covid-19 are:

• health centers (Kataki, Bwana Kucha and Hewa bora), the provincial plan division, Kalemie central prison, the Officers' Mass, the police station (GMI= Mobile Intervention Group) and twenty (20) hand washing points health centers (Katarina Beni, Kalunga and Kituku) and 10 hand washing points in the ten (10) chlorination sites, it means : 1 per site..

Note: The number of distributed Kits at general hospital, the health centers and central prison of Kalemie, depended on the frequency of people, reason why 20 kits were distributed in ten (10) structures.

The handing over ceremony in the health zones was presided over by the National Coordinator of Salvation Army projects in DRC on 20th June, 2020, accompanied by his staff, the representatives of Doctors Heads of two health zones and other members in strict compliance with barrier measures and social distancing. On the occasion of this ceremony, the message of the Coordinator was focused on the funding received from the International Salvation Army, the awareness of the existence of Covid-19 which remains a real problem that threatens the whole world, the strict observance of barrier measures and prevention as recommended by the World Health Organization "WHO" and the presentation of the kit, its composition and its use. After just the symbolic discount, the team responsible for deploying the kits took care of the delivery until June 23 in all the targeted sites.
